Re: Activity Report for May 17, 1996, Meeting

No new permits to drill were issued since your last meeting on February 9. The Premco Western #1 Mohave is shut-in at 1,050 feet, the Arzon #1 State is shut-in pending transfer to the State Land Department as a water well, and Ridgeway Arizona Oil Corporation has yet to begin drilling its CO₂ confirmation wells near St. Johns.

Alpine this summer. There is no further interest in deepening the hole or converting it to a water well. The Survey's heat-flow studies of this hole were presented as part of a poster at the Fall 1995 American Geophysical Union meeting, and the details will be published as an Open File Report later this year.

The U.S. Geological Survey reports that it plans to plug & abandon the geothermal test hole near

Governor Symington signed SB 1075 to continue the Oil and Gas Conservation Commission through July 2006. The tax equity for oil and gas interests bill, SB 1126, passed the Senate but died in the House. The tax equity for oil and gas interests provided by SB 1126 were duplicated in the overall tax reform act, which passed but was vetoed by Governor Symington.

The \$5,000 cash performance bond was returned to Copaquen Associates on March 27, 1996. The Copaquen well was drilled, plugged, and abandoned in compliance with all applicable rules in 1981.

Two different individuals requested release of the \$5,000 performance bond posted by United Gas Search in 1991. United Gas Search constructed the well location in 1991 but never drilled the well. Ruth Tucker, assignee of the bond, requested release to her because the lease was transferred and United Gas Search ceased as operator of the lease. Rodney Ratheal, current lease holder, requested release to him because his company (1) raised the money posted by United Gas Search five years ago and (2) recently supervised and paid for the work of restoring the United Gas Search location. I advised Ruth Tucker that, pursuant to A.A.C. R12-7-103(C), transfer of property did not release the bond. This matter is set for discussion under agenda item 7.

A.A.C. R12-7-182(D) requires a capacity determination upon completion of new storage cavities with verification every five years. Sonar-caliper surveys have been used exclusively to verify cavity capacities in Arizona over the last sixteen years. Our files contain at least two sonar surveys on all cavities and three on several cavities but no volumetric measurements to complement the sonar surveys. I just finished an analysis that shows that sonar surveys provide general but not exact shapes and volumes. Volumetric measurements, on the other hand, provide a more exact volume determination. As a result, my analysis and recommendation to include both volumetric measurements and sonar surveys to provide a more complete and accurate record of volume verification are attached. Agenda item 8 provides for discussion of this matter.

The regular Commission Meeting of February 9, 1996, was called to order by Dr. J. Dale Nations, Chairman, at 10:00 a.m. in Room 111, 416 West Congress, Tucson, Arizona.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF MEETING OF SEPTEMBER 15, 1995

Ms. Worthington moved, seconded by Dr. Clay:

THAT THE MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF SEPTEMBER 15, 1995, BE ACCEPTED AS PRESENTED

Motion carried unanimously.

STATEMENT OF DIRECTOR AND STATE GEOLOGIST

Dr. Fellows welcomed the Commission to the new quarters of the Geological Survey. He reviewed several bills including HB 2386, which consolidates small funds such as the Oil and Gas Conservation Fund into the General Revenue Fund, and SB 1075, which continues the Oil and Gas Conservation Commission through July 2006.

Dr. Fellows discussed the second year of the biennial budget, noting that three new field vehicles were delivered last month and one will be delivered next year. He explained expenditures on the oil and gas program at the request of Dr. Nations.

REPORT OF THE OIL AND GAS PROGRAM ADMINISTRATOR

The activity report of Mr. Rauzi was sent to the Commissioners and has been made a part of these minutes. Mr. Rauzi welcomed Dr. Nation's reappointment, reviewed drilling activity, and reported that Arizona Resource Industries leased an additional 144,000 acres near St. Johns.

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Ms. Worthington asked about activity at the Alpine geothermal hole since being transferred to the U.S. Geological Survey as an observation well. Mr. Rauzi was not aware of any but indicated he would send an inquiry to John Sass, U.S. Geological Survey, and put it on the agenda for the next meeting.

STATUS OF SUNSET REVIEW 1996

SB 1075 continues the Commission through July 2006. Dr. Fellows reported that it passed the Senate Committee by unanimous vote, passed the House Committee by majority vote, and will now go to the Full House. He noted that in order to consolidate the overall number of bills, SB 1075 continues four agencies including the Commission, Department of Mines and Mineral Resources, Power Authority, and Outdoor Recreation Coordinating Commission.

STATUS OF INCENTIVE LEGISLATION

Mr. Rauzi passed out copies of SB 1126, which reduces the property tax rate on oil, gas, and geothermal interests from 100 per cent of assessed value to 27 per cent of assessed value. He reported that the bill passed the Senate Finance Committee on February 5 by unanimous vote, noting the several individuals who spoke in support of the bill including Dr. Fellows. He suggested a press release be issued if the bill becomes law.

FORFEITURE OF BONDS

Mr. Rauzi reported that Copaquen Associates plugged a well in 1981 in compliance with rules but never requested return of the money. He summarized counsel's recommendation to search for a current address through the Attorney General and write a certified letter; and explained that if the money remains unclaimed it may have to go into the general fund. Dr. Nations asked Mr. Rauzi to proceed and report the status in the next meeting.

CALL TO THE PUBLIC

Mr. Haas discussed transferring inspection & enforcement (I & E) functions and royalty collections on federal lands from the federal to the state level. Royalty collections were not likely to be transferred because of industry opposition and it was too soon to tell about transferring I & E functions.

Ms. Worthington moved, seconded by Dr. Clay:

THAT THE COMMISSION GO INTO EXECUTIVE SESSION

Motion carried unanimously. At 11:10 a.m., the Executive Session began.

The regular meeting resumed at 11:46 a.m.

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

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

Dear Dr. Nations:

Civil Unit Chief Counsel Edward Truman asked me to respond to your February 13, 1996 request on behalf of the Arizona Oil & Gas Conservation Commission for general legal advice regarding conflict of interest, appearance of conflicts of interest and responsibilities and liabilities of individual members and commissions as a whole.

Enclosed please find Chapter 8 of the Arizona Agency Handbook and the public service orientation manual for elected and appointed public officials written by the office of the Attorney General which set forth conflicts of interest law in Arizona. Arizona Agency Handbook Section 8.4.2 discusses conflict of interest matters relating to board and commission members.

The essence of the conflict of interest statutes is to prevent public officers or employees with a conflict of interest in a particular public matter or decision from participating in those matters or decisions. Pursuant to Sections 38-501 through 38-511, A.R.S., (Conflict of Interest of Officers and Employees) and decisions of the Arizona courts, it is imperative that a commission member with a conflict of interest in a commission matter declare the conflict in the public records of the commission and refrain from any participation in the commission matter.

A.R.S. § 38-503 sets forth the primary conflict of interest statute and states that any public officer or employee who has, or whose relative has, a "substantial interest" in any contract, sale, purchase, service or decision before the public agency, shall make that interest known in the official records of the agency and refrain from voting upon or otherwise participating in any manner

as an officer or employee in such contract, sale, purchase or decision. Section 38-502(11) defines a "substantial interest" as "any pecuniary or proprietary interest, either direct or indirect, other than a remote interest." Thus, any pecuniary or proprietary interest which a commission member or a member's family has, in a commission matter is a conflict of interest under Arizona law unless the legislature has specifically defined it as a "remote interest," defined at Section 38-502(10).

It is the responsibility of a commission member to identify the circumstances in which actions of the commission might affect him specially and to avoid any situation in which a conflict exists. It is important to note that even if a member is confident that he can be objective in the matter and that the public interest would not be harmed by his participation, the member must disclose the conflict and completely withdraw from any commission consideration of that issue. Arizona's conflicts of interest statutes are broadly construed and substantial civil and criminal penalties have been provided for failure to comply with the statutory requirements. Sections 38-506, 38-510.

Regarding your question relating to protection of boards and commissions from the appearance of conflicts by individual members, Section 8.8.2 states that once a person has disclosed a conflict of interest and withdrawn from participation in the matter, the public officer or employee "must not communicate about the matter with anyone involved in the decision making process in order to avoid the appearance of impropriety." Thus, it appears there is no appearance of impropriety, or conflict of interest, as a matter of law, attaching to a board or commission where individual members with a conflict declare the conflict and refrain from all involvement in the matter. Once a member with a conflict declares a conflict and does not participate in the matter, the board or commission is fully able to consider and act upon the matter with no appearance of a conflict of interest.

As always, if there are questions regarding specific situations involving individual members or additional questions on conflict of interest generally or questions involving any other

Mr. Rauzi maintains a conflict of interest file on behalf of the Oil and Gas Conservation Commission. Please contact him if that file will assist you in your response.


